Launch of an Inclusive and Sustainable Programme - Sásta-Nable Living

Adult Education Service Balbriggan were delighted to launch their Sástanable Living QQI Level 2 Programme on Tuesday, 3rd December 2024. This was a collaborative effort between the Adult Education Literacy Service in Balbriggan and Down Syndrome Ireland funded under the Adult Literacy for Life's Collaboration and Innovation Fund.

It was officially launched by the Mayor of Fingal Brian McDonagh. Also in attendance was Cllr. Grainne Maguire, Joanne Russell, Adult Education Officer, members of the Down Syndrome Ireland team, learners and their support workers from Prosper Fingal and colleagues from DDLETB.

The launch event was a resounding success, highlighting the importance of collaboration in adult education. The Sástanable Living QQI Level 2 Programme is designed to empower learners with the knowledge and skills needed to make sustainable choices in their daily lives.

The project team led by Melanie Loughran and a team of expert teachers created an innovative, engaging programme which will be transformative for our learners in Dublin and Dún Laoghaire ETB and many other ETBs around the country when it is shared nationally. The programme will support learners to play their part in being more sustainable and environmentally conscious.

Participants engage in a variety of activities and projects focused on environmental awareness, waste reduction, and sustainable living practices through mediums such as horticulture and art. The programme aims to foster a sense of community and shared responsibility among learners, encouraging them to take active roles in promoting sustainability within their own communities.

The Adult Education Service Balbriggan and Down Syndrome Ireland are excited about the potential impact of this programme and look forward to seeing the positive changes it will bring to learners and their communities. The initiative represents a significant step forward in further integrating sustainability into adult education, ensuring that learners are equipped to contribute to a more sustainable future.

Ardgillan's Erasmus Journey

Ardgillan College's Erasmus + project focuses on 'Fostering staff and student wellbeing through the development of digital skills' .

In November, five enthusiastic staff members — Ms. Ní Mhurchú, Ms. Dunne, Mr. Walsh, Ms. O'Connor, and Mr. Young traveled to Santa Cruz in the Canary Islands to participate in an Erasmus+ course on Digital Skills. They were thrilled to take part in the course, *"Empowering Classrooms in the Digital Age,"* organised by the Europass Teacher Academy.

During the week-long mobility, staff engaged in hands-on, practical workshops and lessons focused on enhancing digital technology use in the classroom. A key highlight was exploring how artificial intelligence (AI) can support lesson preparation and planning. The Ardgillan team also had the chance to meet and collaborate with teachers from across Europe, sharing experiences and insights on integrating digital skills in education. This unique opportunity provided valuable perspectives on how advancements in digital technology can enrich the teaching and learning experience.

EGGCITING TIMES IN BALLYDOWD SPECIAL CARE SCHOOL

The super students in Ballydowd Special Care School have been busy working on some terrific and unique projects recently.

Led by the keen interest shown by current students in caring for animals, the school hatched a plan! But that wasn't all that hatched......

John from Glennon Farms who offers an incubation programme for schools was contacted and one of our classrooms became home to 20 freshly laid eggs and an incubator. Students named the eggs and got to work on a fun and collaborative chicken project. The stages of development of the chicks inside the eggs were tracked and after 2 weeks the eggs were candled to capture a visual of what was going on inside each individual egg.

One week later, 'Finnuala' hurtled into the world followed in quick succession by her siblings, apart from 'D' who stuck a leg out first instead of her beak and required some extra special care. She was in the right place and students ensured that she had the conditions and minding necessary to thrive and thrive she did. The chicks are going from strength to strength and have a good home lined up beyond the classroom. In between keeping a watchful eye on hatching eggs, learning about and rearing chicks, students somehow found the time to avail of a really showstopping opportunity. They met with Marianne, the lady in charge of set design in RTÉ, to discuss ideas for props that they could create to feature on the set for the Late Late Toy Show!

Students were entrusted with the top-secret theme of the Toy Show and got to work around the clock (or around the cluck!). The workshop in the North Pole hasn't a patch on the standard and speed of production that has gone on in the Art and Woodwork classrooms of Ballydowd. The Toy Show is often the most-watched programme of the year on Irish television and they certainly came to the right place for the contributions of creative, talented and deserving young people. Collinstown Park Community College The Great Outdoors in Clondalkin

The Neilstown Road may not be the first place we think of when talking about activities in the natural environment, but Outdoor Education is alive and well in Collinstown Park Community College. In keeping with the college motto 'Encourage Inspire Enrich', students have been undertaking a range of activities connected with Forest Schools and Bushcraft. These activities include shelter building, pioneering, fabrication projects using forest materials and tools, fire lighting skills and cooking.

Learning Safe Skills

Such activities encourage experiential learning that develops key skills which are beneficial in their own right but can also be transferable to other facets of life. Some key outcomes for the student can be improved communication, negotiating and compromising when problem-solving, and working with others.

These activities also benefit the student – teacher relationship. Participating in Outdoor Education and Forest Schools can help to develop a more relaxed relationship which can then transfer into a better classroom-based relationship. In turn, this can improve the student's motivation to engage in academic activities.

Not all forest school activities have to happen outdoors. Students also enjoyed a pioneering project ('A' frame seat) indoors on a rainy day.

Mental Health Matters at Deansrath Community College

An innovative initiative aimed at improving Mental Health services was launched recently with support from local organisations including Dublin GAA.

The idea to create the campaign arose from informal discussions among members of the Ethos and Wellbeing student action group at Deansrath Community College. The students noted that while various groups support Mental Health in different ways, there can be a reluctance among young people to speak out about such matters. There has also been some confusion about how to access support and identify the most appropriate service.

The Mental Health Matters campaign seeks improvements by calling for: clarity of service provision as well as a simplified referral process; increased support from government to support community clubs and facilities; and finally, the campaign aims to 'end the stigma' by normalising conversations around mental health through curriculum development, which will increase opportunities for classroom discussion and the training of student leaders.

The initiative has even reached the floor of Leinster House with local TDs supporting the programme and committing to pursuing its recommendations at relevant sub-committees of the Oireachtas. The Mental Health Maters campaign received universal praise during a Dáil debate in October for carrying out a "huge amount of working in breaking the stigma on Mental Health". Well done to all involved!



'Everyone a Reader' school library project launches in Clondalkin | Childrens Books Ireland

Congratulations to Deansrath CC and St.Kevin's CC who have launch 'Everyone A Reader' project that has been sponsored by a local engineering company and supported by Children's Books Ireland.

The project aims to build a love of reading among students, staff and the wider community. Each school will receive 400 new books for each year of the project. Of these, two hundred will be chosen by the expert Children's Books Ireland team, selected to capture the students' interest and attention, and to reflect the richness and diversity of Irish society. A further one hundred titles will be chosen by the students and teachers in each school, further building a sense of ownership over their new library.

Every year for the three years, the schools will also receive class sets of books, which make up the final one hundred books and which will facilitate



the set-up of book clubs for TY students. A Champion of Reading – a well-known Irish author or illustrator – will work with the school over three years to encourage creativity and engagement with the library.

Staff will be trained in maximising the use of their new library, while schoolwide surveys will measure the long-term impact of the project.

Yvonne Crowley, a teacher at Deansrath Community College, said: 'The Everyone a Reader project is a massive opportunity for our school to develop and foster a love of reading and encourage reading for enjoyment in our students. 'The excitement in the faces of the students as they browsed all the books is one that I have never seen before and gave them a new way to experience modern titles and books that they could relate to. We are so grateful to have this programme running in our school to enhance our students' love of reading.'



Catalan Ministry of Education visit Rath Dara Community College and Coláiste Chillian

Nuria and Sandra, visitors from the Catalan Ministry of Education, were warmly welcomed and hosted by DDLETB (on behalf of the Department of Education). They visited Rath Dara Community College to find out more about supports for EAL students and why Ireland does so well in reading in PISA studies (Ireland rated 2nd out of 81 countries in 2018, and 11th in both Maths and Science out of 81 countries).

In Rath Dara CC, they were amazed at the work being done by Ms Deane and Ms Thomson in the EAL Department to support students who had recently arrived in Ireland and who FOR NOW, had little English.

The visitors learned about the school's dedication to inclusion and wellbeing, going above and beyond to support all students. They explored the library, managed by a full-time librarian, and toured the impressive new STEM/Digital room. This space allows students to engage in hands-on learning and creativity, experimenting with science, technology, 3D printing, podcasting, robotics, and more, both during classes and after school.



Nuria and Sandra also visited Coláiste Chilliain to explore how immersion education operates in a setting where parents may not speak the language of instruction, and where the school actively fosters an environment that immerses students in the Irish Language. This is similar to what is happening in Catalunya where Catalan is becoming more of a minority language as Spanish is spoken more and more in schools.

A highlight of the visit to Coláiste Chilliain was the outstanding performance by the school's talented traditional Irish musicians.

Erasmus Edina Project, Visit to Dublin

In October, 21 teachers and researchers, from Belgium, Netherland and Spain, participating in an Erasmus project, visited 2 DDLETB schools: St Kevin's CC and Adamstown CC.

The focus of the visit was to discover more about the integration and language learning journey of students from a migrant background who have been completely immersed in school life from their arrival in the country. The system in Ireland is different from what young people experience in other European countries where a parallel system is in place. Students reach a specific language level and can then transition to be with their peers.

The visitors were impressed with their school visits and noted some very positive aspects in each school:

 They were impressed by the availability of the school newsletters and digital displays in multiple languages, and the wide range of languages offered for the Leaving Certificate, with exams taken in students' own schools, amazed them. They praised the school journal as an excellent communication tool with parents, noting its comprehensive and relevant content.

- They highlighted the importance of friendships and peer interaction as opportunities to practice the language of schooling.
- The normalcy of diversity in Irish schools stood out to them and they appreciated the inclusivity of allowing scarves (hijabs) matching the school uniform, contrasting it with bans on religious symbols in some European countries.
- They were intrigued by students using their first language in class to support learning and valued the collaborative environment. The integration of students into mainstream classes, regardless of language ability, was highly commended, as was the emphasis on high expectations and challenging, ageappropriate content.

- They were surprised by the rapid improvement in students' English proficiency and their awareness of their CEFR levels within a year of arrival.
- They noted the enrolment policies, catchment areas, and the REALT Coordinator's role in ensuring all students can access local schools and they were also impressed by the high retention rate post-Junior Certificate
- They appreciated Ireland's mixed-ability approach and the delayed finalisation of subject choices, contrasting it with early streaming in other countries.
- Language support during Irish was seen as a safe space for students, offering respite and comfort.
- And initiatives like Breakfast Clubs, HSCL visits, iPads, coding, and Home Economics were noted as strengths within the school environment.

SUSTAINABLE STAFFING FOR EALIN DDLETB

Teachers from Adamstown CC, Castleknock CC, Grange CC, Mount Seskin CC, Luttrellstown CC and St Finian's CC have all recently trained to teach EAL - which will ensure the quality and sustainability of staffing provision for EAL across our schools.

Teachers attended class in June and sat their exam on 23rd August to gain

internationally recognised certification from Cambridge English.

2 teachers from City of Dublin ETB, 2 from Tipperary ETB and 1 Limerick and Clare ETB also took part in this training. We were also delighted to welcome 2 Ukrainian teachers and other teachers who heard of the course through the Migrant Teacher Project, Marino.

Feedback from the participants was extremely positive:

I have also thoroughly enjoyed exploring an area of education I haven't had the opportunity to experience yet. It has been very beneficial to mention in interviews and it has been particularly enjoyable to engage and network with colleagues from across the country"

"This training gives me confidence to work with EAL students and to encourage other staff members in its approach"

"My awareness of L2 learners' experience in the Irish classroom has become much more informed"


The annual Festival of Music returns next March with performances by students from DDLETB Community Colleges and Gaelcholáistí.




Literacy Changes Lives



2024 has been a spectacular year for adult literacy in DDLETB FET. This year we have provided literacy, numeracy, digital literacy and ESOL programmes to approximately 7000 learners in our Adult Education Service.

Programmes range from Levels 1 to 4 on the National Framework of Qualifications, and many are accredited through QQI. In addition to this, we have continued to provide Key Skills support to other FET learners including Study Skills for apprentices in our 3 Training Centres. Literacy is still a major challenge in Irish society, contributing not only to financial hardship and unemployment but also impacting health and wellbeing.



However, we are determined to help learners gain the skills and self-confidence they need to transform their lives and the lives of people in their family and community. Our work in adult literacy this year has included implementation of the national Adult Literacy for Life (ALL) Strategy.

The Strategy has enabled us to apply for additional funding to support collaboration and innovation in our provision. Our ETB was the first to produce a regional action plan for adult literacy. We did this in collaboration with partner organisations such as the libraries, DEASP, Citizens Information and the banking sector. Many of these are representatives of our Regional Adult Literacy Coalition. This group meets regularly to help create literacy-friendly communities throughout Fingal, South Dublin and Dún Laoghaire Rathdown.

We are very proud of our learners who have overcome significant obstacles to undertake their learning journey with us. We are very grateful to our tutors who embody our core values in DDLETB of professionalism, excellence, equality, respect and support. While it is impossible to capture all that we have done in adult literacy over the last 12 months, here are some of the highlights.

- We piloted a QQI Level 2 programme on sustainability and the environment for neuro-divergent learners in Balbriggan, in partnership with Down Syndrome Ireland.
- We became the first ETB in the country to receive a charter from Age Friendly Ireland for our adult literacy and adult education provision for older learners in Swords.
- We began a partnership with the local financial sector in Blanchardstown to improve their customer service for vulnerable customers and we held a financial literacy event which was attended by the Minister for Finance.
- We have collaborated with South Dublin County Council libraries to offer Media Literacy and Financial Literacy talks to over 450 people in 6 local libraries in Lucan, Clondalkin and Tallaght. We have also strengthened our partnership with libraries in Fingal, South Dublin and Dún Laoghaire Rathdown to enable them to offer a welcoming and inclusive experience to library users with literacy needs.
- We piloted a bespoke ESOL programme for visually impaired learners in Tallaght: the first of its kind in the FET sector.
- We delivered a pilot programme in Dún Laoghaire on reducing barriers to learning by using assistive technology and adopting a Universal Design for Learning (UDL) approach. The programme received a special commendation from the international judging panel in the John Kelly Awards for Universal Design in Further and Higher Education.
- We ran summer programmes in Loughlinstown on the theme of health and wellbeing and developed a creativity and wellness toolkit.
- And we welcomed over 100 tutors to an event in October to celebrate their contribution to our adult literacy and ESOL provision.

New Team DDLETB members at Luttrellstown Community College and Coláiste na Tulchann.

We are delighted to announce that our two new school therapy dogs – Darwin and Murph – have officially arrived at Luttrellstown Community College and Coláiste na Tulchann!!

Following our successful application to My Canine Companion (MCC), a national Irish charity (RCN 20079147) – LCC recently received the fantastic news that the two young puppies were to be assigned as therapy dogs to our school.

On Friday, September 20th, Darwin and Murph received a warm and heartfelt welcome on their very first day at LCC; helping them to feel instantly at home in their new surroundings!

The School Therapy Dog Programme, developed by My Canine Companion, was the first of its kind in Ireland. Initially piloted in Munster in 2020, it now supports over 60 schools across the country. Research has consistently shown the positive impact therapy dogs can have in educational environments. Schools involved in this programme have reported significant improvements in wellbeing, mental health, anxiety levels, attendance, as well as staff and overall school morale.

Even in their first week at LCC, Darwin and Murph have created a wave of positivity throughout the whole school community. Some of the students took the time this week to discuss the effect that the dogs have had since their arrival: Junior student Alex told us that *"I love dogs. they just put a smile on your face every time you see them"*.

His fellow 1st Year classmate, Kate, added

"They just make everyone feel loved... You try to get to school early to see if the puppies are there. If the dog is excited to see you, it makes you feel excited but also when they're calm, it can make you feel calm too." Senior cycle student Samuel remarked that he "can really see the benefits of having them in the school already – The morale around the place has just risen right away – Everyone is so happy to have them about."

The two dogs will continue to attend school and will have regular training sessions with My Canine Companion until they graduate as part of their School Therapy Programme; [You can view some of their fellow therapy dogs' recent graduation on MCC social media here.]

Darwin and Murph will generally be accompanied by their handlers, who are designated members of LCC staff. The dogs will live with the handlers and, as they mature and complete further training, their involvement in school activities will gradually increase. The puppies will always be on a lead, and they will only interact with those who request it. LCC Board of Management has recently approved our School Dog Therapy Policy and associated Risk Assessment, which are published on our school website and contain more information in this regard.

We welcome any assistance the community may be able to offer, whether through sponsorship or helping with the care and maintenance of our therapy dogs. To sum up the overall impact of Darwin and Murph on school life, Leaving Certificate student Sarah explains:

"School can be stressful sometimes...and even though dogs don't say anything, it's just their presence. They don't judge anyone, they just want to love everyone...If you're having a bad day and you meet one of the dogs, they just want to get to know you and to say "hello. It really boosts your mood, and





I suppose, it helps you to feel better about yourself".

The school community is embarking on a truly exciting journey and couldn't be more enthusiastic about the positive effect that this initiative will bring to students and to the entire school community in the coming years.

Darwin is an energetic and affectionate Irish-Doodle and his buddy Murph is a playful, yet quite laid-back, Golden Retriever. Both are already proving great company for each other during the school day!

Communities of Practice Enhancing Subject Department Collaboration in Firhouse Community College


For the last three years, Firhouse CC Maths department have been involved with the Access Maths programme in Trinity College Dublin. The school are delighted to be a part of this innovative project which allows the Maths department more opportunities to collaborate and plan with Maths teachers around the country.

They redeveloped our Junior Cycle units of learning to incorporate more task-based learning to improve student problem solving capabilities and they have found that students are more resilient, willing to take more risks and more engaged in Maths lessons. Working closely as a department and collaborating on all lessons has also introduced peer observation within the department.

Firhouse CC are also part of an Erasmus+ programme with Trinity College which involves developing units of learning with teachers from schools in Austria, Sweden and Czech Republic. Teachers have found this sharing of best practices invaluable in supporting improvement within their departments. As part of the programme, students have participated in a Maths Fest in Trinity College Dublin which has provided a wonderful opportunity for them to experience Maths outside of the classroom.

During Maths Week at Youthreach Lucan, we held a variety of engaging activities from Monday to Thursday, exploring different aspects of mathematics. We kicked off the week with a video produced in-house, highlighting how maths is integrated into each subject taught at Youthreach.

One of the week's highlights was a treasure hunt through Lucan village, where students discovered the maths involved in everyday life. We also held a bingo game, replacing numbers with maths-related words for a fun twist.



On the following day, we focused on estimation. Students were given a jar and one sweet and had to estimate how many sweets would fit inside.

They also estimated the height of a tree in the car park using just a meter stick, and for fun, they guessed the distance to the nearest shop in "bananas" as a quirky unit of measurement.

Additionally, we challenged them to estimate the combined height of all the students if they stood on each other's shoulders.

The next day, we revealed the actual values for each estimation activity and compared them to the students' guesses.

On Thursday, we explored probability, setting up a roulette table and giving a presentation on gambling, its risks, and how it affects the brain.

We found resources on the website <u>https://www.problemgambling.ie</u> After demonstrating the game, we predicted that players would lose their money quickly, which they did.

We wrapped up the week with a table quiz, revisiting the maths found in each subject. Prizes were awarded to the top-performing students, bringing a fun and educational week to a close.

MATHEMATICAL MASTERY: CELEBRATING EXCELLENCE IN EDUCATION DURING MATHS WEEK.

At Scoil Chormaic CNS they celebrated Maths week with a focus on encouraging playfulness. Incorporating playful elements into our Maths lessons through games, hands on activities, Maths hunts, stories, and challenges.

Some learners created Maths related challenges through creative problem solving. They also had an estimation station where each pupil got to guess how many sweets were in the jar and Butlers Bingo was a whole school event that gave many belly laughs. Using ICT pupils played fun interactive games, as well as using the Beebots to learn in a fun way. There was lots of collaborative learning to instil a love for Maths.

A new 'Éire' of Music for Scoil Chormaic Community National School

At Scoil Chormaic CNS, embracing our ETB core value of Community, we continuously liaise with our local community to provide excellence in education. Through our strong links within the community, Scoil Chormaic CNS was selected by The Irish Music Institute & Song to participate in a new Traditional Music access programme which began in September of this year.

The programme named 'Pathway to the Well' is Funded by the Arts Council & Music Network Ireland. This new initiative will see the institute work in partnership with Scoil Chormaic CNS, as well as many local community groups and musical bodies to introduce traditional Irish music to children from culturally diverse backgrounds.

The programme will be led by Niall Preston traditional music educator at the IMIS, and all pupils will have the opportunity to learn how to play many instruments such as; the Bodhrán, Tin Whistle, The Harp, and many more. A short documentary will be recorded across the year to record the pupils progress throughout the programme. The pupils will also have the opportunity to perform with other local schools in the local music Theatre 'The Lark' and some students will be offered music scholarships at the end of the year.

The Launch of the Programme:

Speaking at the official launch, programme director Dr Seán McElwain noted the inclusive nature of traditional music and its valuable contribution to the creation of community.

"Traditional music has long been community-based music. Allowing people from various backgrounds to come together through music is at the heart of music-making throughout Ireland. However, it can often lie beyond the experience and reach of many new community members. With this programme, we hope to make traditional music more accessible and visible to our culturally diverse local community and contribute to the development of an even more inclusive community for traditional music in the Fingal region, which now has the largest population of young people in the country".





Provision Mapping in DDLETB A Whole School Journey

Provision Mapping was initially created in 2016 by Dr Johanna Fitzgerald, Mary Immaculate College in collaboration with Limerick and Clare ETB. This process is currently being implemented across the sixteen ETBs in over 200 Community Colleges. Twenty-four DDLETB Community Schools are currently engaging in the provision mapping process (since 2021).

Provision Mapping is designed to foster collaboration in inclusive special education between school staff, students, parents/ carers and wider education partners, benefiting all students, including those with additional needs and disabilities. The process uses school selfevaluation (SSE) to develop a school provision map, reflecting current provision for students with additional and special educational needs across the Continuum of Support.

Areas of Need investigated for provision across the Continuum of Support include Numeracy, Literacy, Language, Social and emotional learning, Physical / and or Sensory Needs, Social and communication Skills, Behaviour, Self – Management and / or organisational Skills, Study Skills, Life Skills, Exceptional Ability including dual / multiple exceptionalities and medical needs. Schools compile all these evidence-based provisions into a single summary document known as a provision map.

Provision Mapping affirms and acknowledges existing good practice in relation to inclusive and special/ additional education in schools. It focuses on capacity building. It serves as a foundation for strategic budgeting, resource allocation, and identifying staff professional learning and development needs.

Provision Mapping enhances coherent approaches to school improvement by integrating existing policies and frameworks across the Continuum of Support (i.e. the implementation of the Ethos Framework, the Wellbeing Policy Statement, the Guidance Framework and future Bí Cinéalta Framework).

Student Voice – Youthreach, a Learners Experience

Hello, my name is Darja.

I am endlessly grateful and proud to be able to tell my story here and I hope to reach out to people that feel they are in a system that may not be working for them.

Firstly, a little bit about me. I come from an immigrant background. My parents were challenged with settling into a new country, but they have remained steady and resilient. My parents have been a great support for me throughout my whole life. Raising a child in a country you know very little about is often a difficult task and I am endlessly grateful for their hard work.

As a young child I really enjoyed school. I enjoyed learning and was always ready to jump at any opportunity to participate in clubs. However, I was also a deeply anxious child and struggled to get help when in secondary school. I would continue to try and be involved in my school's extra-curricular activities and did my best in the academic sense. However, I sometimes found relationships in school difficult.

In my teens I started to go through mental health issues, and I struggled. My knowledge of getting support was very limited and I began to miss a lot of days in school. I did try to find support, but I found it difficult, and I knew I had to find an environment that would suit me better and support me to a greater extent.

When I decided to leave school, I initially faced some hesitation about transitioning to Youthreach. Even though I had stopped attending school, it seemed like staying in school and completing my Leaving Certificate was seen as the only way to succeed academically. Despite this, I was determined to follow a path that felt right for me and while my parents were initially unsure about my choice, they stood by me and supported me throughout the process.

Youthreach was a completely different world, much smaller and with a lot less people. Due to the smaller numbers, teachers had more time to engage with the students individualy, and the subjects were unlike what mainstream education taught. Although I did find that I missed some subjects like Art and History.

In mainstream school, I often felt like success was measured by how well you could remember information. In contrast I felt Youthreach focused on preparing students for both the workforce and higher education. It also emphasised learning at your own pace, and any setbacks were met with support. I feel that this helps to create an environment where progress and personal growth are prioritised. I had no idea what I wanted to do in life, but I had a lot of interests, and I felt like Youthreach gave me a massive push forward to explore my various options. I felt supported by my teachers, received excellent guidance and the time and space to participate academically while taking care of my mental health.

I graduated from Youthreach with a major award at QQI Level Four. I then enrolled in a PLC in Liberties College for Applied Social Studies. I still had no proper idea of what I wanted to do but took an interest in the subjects. This was such an important period for me, where I rekindled my passion for learning and was able to get a good footing for the next big step in my education which was being accepted to Dublin City University (DCU). My years at Youthreach did came with several challenges for me personally. I had a hard time finding myself, and as with all group situations, there were at times conflict between people in my class. This however made me understand the importance of conflict resolution and in a way, it helped me grow.

It is important to recognise the opportunity Youthreach gives students to thrive. I feel that alternative places like Youthreach where students can pick themselves up again and get support are vital in recreating a better education system. I believe there is always room for change in education. I would like to be a voice for that change, and I will continue to share my 'life saving experience'. I attended a small Youthreach centre, but it gave me a big stepping stone forward. I am now in my first year in the BAJH programme in DCU studying both Human Growth and History and I am one of many people that have taken an alternative pathway to education.

For me, Youthreach changed my life, it gave me the opportunity to learn, and the teachers encouraged me and spent time ensuring my self-esteem and confidence grew. I still visit Balbriggan Youthreach often, and I will never forget what the teachers did for me.

Thank you to Darja for sharing her story with us and being so open about her experience of education. We wish her every success at DCU and in the future and look forward to connecting with her again.
